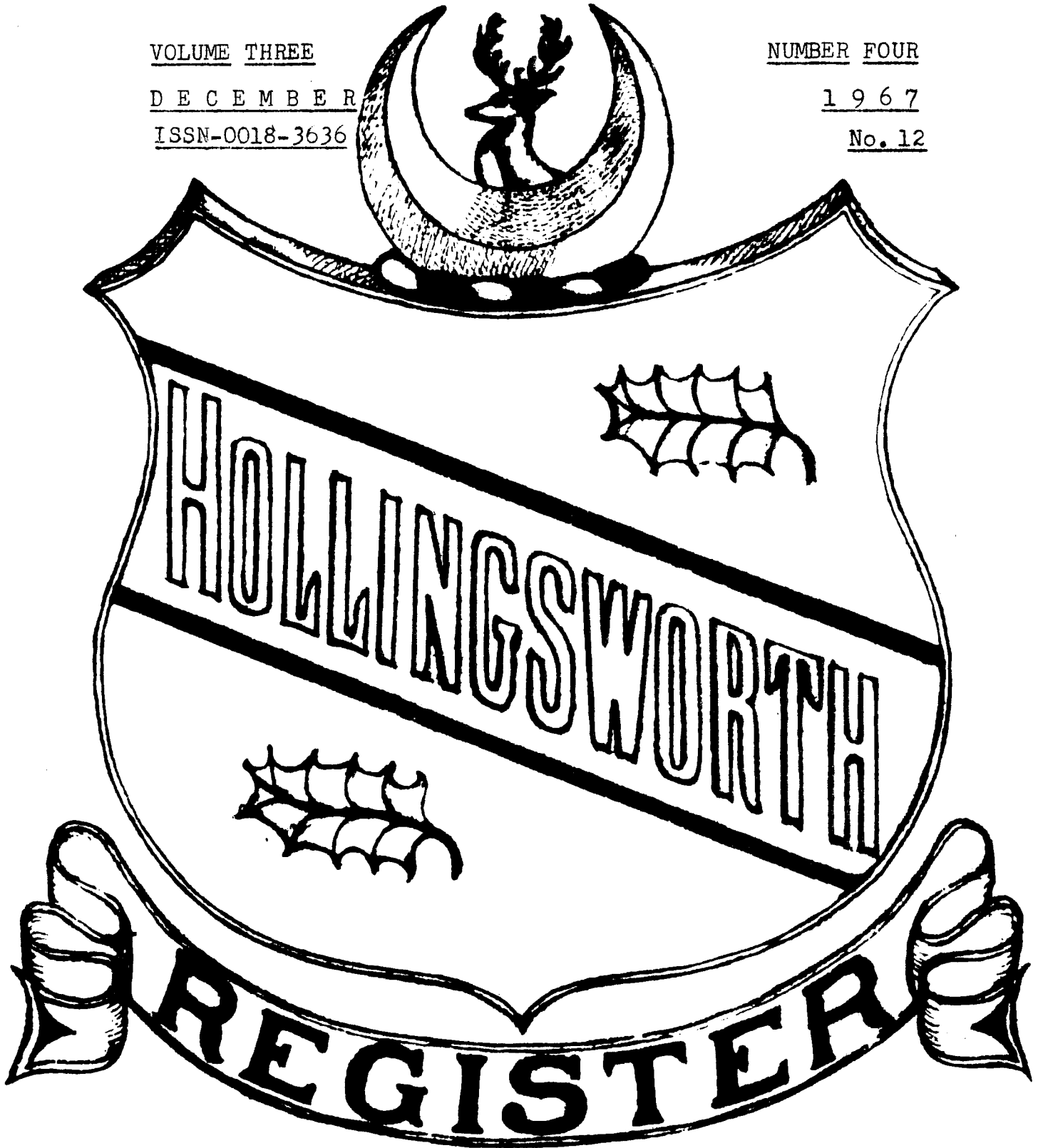

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## MEANING OF THE NAME

The surname Hollingworth is derived from a place in northeast Cheshire, of the same name, supposedly the place called "Holisurde" in the Domesday Book for Cheshire, and pronounced "Hollis-worth," but probably intended to be "Hollinworth." It is in the Parish of Mottram-in-Longdendale, a few miles south of Manchester. It is possible that several separate families using this place as a surname came into existence at an early day. There are also two other places with this name in Lancashire north of Manchester. The Cheshire place was barren, and called waste at the time of Domesday (1086) and it was not until about the time of Magna Carta (1215) that we find any person using the name as a personal family name. This was "Tomas De Holinewurth" (here the name is transliterated into Latin) who was a signatory on a charter of about that period. The two Anglo-Saxon words, Holegn (or Holyn), a Holly bush; and Worp (or Worde) meaning an enclosure, or farmstead, are said to be the origin of the name for this place now called Hollingworth in Cheshire, or, "A farm (homestead) enclosed by holly bushes," or simply "Holly Farm." In later centuries a medial "s" came to be used by some of the families, but not as a general rule earlier than 1620. There are now five generally used forms: Hollingsworth, Hollinsworth, Hollingworth, Hollinworth and Hollandsworth. These are regularly found in the indexes to vital records from 1837 at St. Catherine's House, London, and in most telephone or city directories for large cities in England and America.

## INTENT OF THIS QUARTERLY

Hollingsworth Register is now entering its eleventh year of publication. It started in April, 1965, and its purpose remains as it was at that time: To publish verbatim copies or abstracts of records of the family world wide from the earliest times to the present day. Nearly every name of our family from the U.S. Census, 1790 through 1860, has been published here. About 1,700,000 pages of census were scoured to produce that result. We think no other family has thus been served.

The Hollingsworths of Pratt's Hollow, New York

SAMUEL DANIEL HOLLINGSWORTH is the progenitor of this family. He was born c1782 in the south of Ireland. Present research indicates that probably he was a younger son of Thomas and Alice (Oakes) Hollingsworth. That couple dwelt at a farm in the townland of "Tomduff" in the Parish of Killenagh, County Wexford. We will speak of them more thoroughly below. Samuel D. Hollingsworth died Feb. 6, 1850, in Eaton, Madison County, New York, U.S.A., of inflammation of the lungs at the age of 67 years. His name is inscribed on the family monument in Spring (Pratt's) cemetery in the town of Eaton. However, our valued correspondent, Mrs. Helen Butler, Fairport, N.Y., believes Samuel actually was buried in Fairview cemetery, on the old Tooke (Tuke) farm, not too far from the Spring cemetery.

Samuel D. Hollingsworth married before 1812. It is not known whether he married in Ireland or in America. The name of his wife before marriage was ESTHER HOLLINGSWORTH, a first or second cousin. She was born c1788, in Ireland, and died July 1, 1863 at Eaton, N.Y., aged 75 years, and is buried in Spring cemetery.

HOLLINGSWORTH, son of Nicholas & Lucinda (STYLES) Hollingsworth, natives of Co. Wexford, Ireland. (REGISTER, Vol. 3, p. 104.) Issue: one child, "Blind" JOHN HOLLINGSWORTH (1857-1911) of Morrisville, N.Y.
3. THOMAS, b. Dec. 31, 1818; d. Mar. 6, 1844, aged 25. Unmarried.
4. ELIZABETH ANN, b. c1820; d. April 8, 1899, Augusta, Oneida Co., N.Y. aged about 79. (Death certificate says "about 84"); bur. in Deansboro cemetery, *ibid.* Married (1) Apr. 15, 1853, ANDREW H. CAREY. He was born c1823; d. Feb. 22, 1882, Augusta, N.Y. No issue. Married (2) about 1893, GEORGE A. COLLINS. (Her Will, 7 May, 1896.) No issue.
5. JOHN, b. April 3, 1822; d. Feb. 8, 1863, aged 40, Stockbridge, Madison Co., N.Y. Farmer. Married a widow, Mrs. JANE VANSLYKE, maiden name unknown. She had 3 children, Amelia, Peter & Rollin VanSlyke, by first marriage. Issue by John Hollingsworth, one child: SAMUEL D. HOLLINGSWORTH, b. 1861; d. Oct. 21, 1862, at 1½ years. She then married EDWIN HOLLINGSWORTH, cousin of John, son of Nicholas & Lucinda (STYLES) Hollingsworth, as above, and moved to Michigan. (REGISTER, Vol. 3, p. 104.)
6. SAMUEL, b. c1825; d. Nov. 12, 1875, Eaton, aged 50, unmarried. Farmer. Took over his father's farm and improved it.
7. WILLIAM, b. c1826; d. Sept. 12, 1905, Smithfield, Madison Co., N.Y., aged 79. Farmer. Bur. Spring cemetery. (No marker.) Married a widow, Mrs. MARGARET SNELL, maiden name unknown.

She was born c1818, died Sept. 30, 1879, Smithfield, aged 61. Buried in Spring cemetery. (Name on monument.) Issue: ELIZA A., born 1859; d. Nov. 21, 1861, ae 2 years, (MARY\* married JASPER B. NORTHRUP), ESTHER. William Hollingsworth was the last survivor.) \*Step-daughter.

8. SARAH MARIA, b. c1829; d. Nov. 22, 1902, Fenner, Madison Co., N.Y., aged about 72. Bur. Spring cemetery (no marker). Married, Mar. 20, 1855, St. Thomas' Episcopal Church, Hamilton, N.Y., THOMAS HOLLINGSWORTH, son of Nicholas and Lucinda (STYLES) Hollingsworth, as above. (REGISTER, Vol. 3, page 104.) Issue: SAMUEL D. (1856), HENRY SAMUEL, b. Nov. 15, 1858, d. March 12, 1872, ae 14. (Retarded.), FREDERICK NICHOLAS, b. Apr. 7, 1864; d. Mar. 6, 1871 ae 7; WILLIAM (1867), EDWIN, (1870) CHARLES (1873). (Dates approximate.) NOTE: William (1826) had son in law JOHN DIABLE.

Clues which support our unproven theory that Esther the wife of our subject, Samuel Daniel Hollingsworth, was a Hollingsworth herself by birth, are : (1) Death certificate of the daughter Sarah Maria, as above, which states that her mother's name was "Esther Hollingsworth" and (2) Note in the 1865 New York State Census showing that the retarded or idiotic child Henry Samuel Hollingsworth, was a child of parents who were cousins as of grandparents (Samuel & Esther) who were cousins as well. We know his paternal grandparents, Nicholas and Lucy Hollingsworth were not cousins. Nearly all of the above named people are buried in Spring Cemetery. (See the following article.) Esther Hollingsworth emigrated to America in 1811.

Samuel D. Hollingsworth came to America also in 1811. This information is on his marker. On Nov. 23, 1811, he was named one of the Church Wardens in a newly formed Episcopal Church in the town of Eaton which he helped to found. We know nothing of its name. Other Wardens included James Connor, Michael Tuke, Thomas Hubbard, John Kearon or Kern, Guy Sanford and Samuel Percival. All these men and their families emigrated to New York, probably via Canada or Boston, between 1808 and 1811, according to information in the family records and in the county histories. All were strictly "Old English" in belief, which explains the immediate erection of a church conformable to the Church of England. At a later time, the Hollingsworths belonged to St. Thomas' P.E. Church in Hamilton, New York. The following membership list (in part) was sent to us by Rev. Wm. F. Myers, present Rector:

Members of St. Thomas' Episcopal Church, April 1, 1863 -

Mrs. Esther Hollingsworth, Samuel Hollingsworth; Thomas Hollingsworth, Mrs. Sarah Maria Hollingsworth, Nicholas Hollingsworth; William Hollingsworth, Mrs. Margaret Hollingsworth; Joseph C. Hollingsworth, Mrs. Alice Hollingsworth and one child ... All Baptized Communicants.

Later generations belonged to other churches. Blind John Hollingsworth of Morrisville used to pump the organ in the Congregational Church in Morrisville. Many of the other so-called "English-Irish" settlers of this region joined the Wesleyan Methodist Societies. But evidently true to their heritage, the Hollingsworths of Samuel's own generation and that of his children, remained in the "Old Church."

True also to their fashion, the descendants of this family do not readily reply to enquiries made about family history! But as is also

usually the case, some of them have been very helpful. (These helpful people are always in the minority!) Mrs. Ralph G. Snyder of Herkimer, New York, is one such helpful lady. Herewith we reproduce her first letter:

Sept. 10, 1967

"Dear Mr. Hollingsworth,

"Yes, I am a Hollingsworth. I am sorry I haven't answered your letter before. I have been ill; am better now. Have been going over the old bibles I have here.

"Undoubtedly you wonder why I did not type all of this. I was a school teacher in Herkimer several years. I never took typing. My mother taught school many years.

"This had to be in long-hand."

"Sincerely,

Mrs. Grace B. Snyder.

"P.S. Please return the clippings. Thank you."

Accompanying the letter were quotations from her father's (Samuel D. Hollingsworth) family bible, and that of her grand-aunt, Elizabeth Ann Collins. Her father, Samuel Daniel Hollingsworth (b. Nov. 28, 1856; died Oct. 30, 1940) is listed above on page 134, child of Thomas and Sarah Maria (Hollingsworth) Hollingsworth. He married Etta E. Brown, born Nov. 13, 1857, Favetteville, Onondaga Co., N.Y. died May 10, 1918 at Utica, N.Y. They married Nov. 17, 1880, at Favetteville. Her grandparents (Mrs. Snyder's) on her father's side were both born with our surname, and three of her great-grandparents as well.

Regrettably, the Madison County histories failed to publish much data about our cousins. The oldest, that written by Mrs. Hammond in the 1880's, refers briefly to this "Irish Settlement." The explanation may be the stigma attached to the Irish in those days. But remember: Our Hollingsworths were English to the core; not a drop of real Irish in them! Mr. Dempster J. Tooke, of Cazenovia, New York, penned a letter, Mar. 15, 1917, to Wm. Dempster Hoard, Ft. Atkinson, Wisconsin, (a former governor of Wisconsin); in which he mentioned this slighting:

"My dear old friend ... You asked me to bring out of oblivion of more than half a century, such recollections as I possess of what was known as the Irish Settlement in the town of Eaton, Madison County, New York. This was a notable event in the history of Madison County, indeed, I may say the most notable of its time...and should have received at the hands of those who attempted to write a history of the county, a deservedly generous mention, but I regret to say that it was passed over as an event not worthy even of the slightest mention...This shows how few who attempt to write history possess a true perspective of historic values or a vision of what in reality constitutes history..." He then recited from 'dim memory' the names he recalled as making up the settlement..."Stringer, Tooke, Kern, Philpot, Marshall, Tackaberry, Fearon, Belton, Critchley, Acton, Burn (Byrne), and Hollingsworth." Incorrectly, Mr. Tooke stated that they were "Scotch-Irish" from Ulster in the north of Ireland. Our study, and many records prove that none of the above-named families were.

Of course, all of them came from the area near Arklow, county of Wicklow, which is south of Dublin, whereas Ulster, the northern province, is north of Dublin. Needless to say, if just one sketch of a Wexford Hollingsworth ever is located in any history book it will be a huge surprise to us! No, not one has ever been found. Were these Hollingsworths too proud to contribute money to the historical companies to have family sketches published? Or, being "Irish," did the historians pass by without calling on them?

The Biographical Review Company of Chicago, Ills., published the best of all the biographical type of county histories, in our opinion. The sketches usually gave the parentage of the subject, as well as the names of all four of the grandparents, and even farther back, if known. The Biographical Review of Madison County, New York, (1886) page 420, gave a sketch of George Fearon, deceased, born in Ireland in 1781, a son of Robert Fearon, a prosperous farmer, who on Feb. 17, 1779, had married Amelia Gaven...his farm was "known as Bally Rush farm, situated three miles from Arklow, County of Wicklow, and thirty miles from Dublin." REGISTER, Vol. 3, page 106, line 5 shows proof that the "Feran" family held Ballyrush in 1750. George Fearon came to the United States, first to Boston, in 1811, a voyage of seven weeks. It is very likely that Samuel & Esther Hollingsworth were on that same vessel. Page 436 of the same biographical work recites a sketch of James Marshall, whose "father, John Marshall, was born in County Wicklow, Ireland; but, according to information which is considered reliable, the family was of English ancestry...Although of Irish descent, Mr. Marshall proves his English Ancestry by strongly upholding English laws. His grandfather was an Orangeman, and very prominent as a participator in the Irish Rebellion..." (We ought to add here, his part was certainly not with the Irish rebels, but with the English, in suppressing the mischievous and bloodthirsty whelps.) When your editor read the above words they thrilled him beyond words. It echoed with the stories about his own ancestor, Frederick Hollingsworth, who, according to one granddaughter, "escaped to America when the Catholics massacred the whole Hollingsworth family." (Pure and totally unverified legend, of course.)

The supposed parents of our subject, Samuel D. Hollingsworth, as stated at the beginning of this article were Thomas and Alice (Oakes) Hollingsworth of Tomduff, Killenagh Parish, County Wexford. Note two of the oldest of Samuel's children were named Alice and Thomas. A lease for three lives was taken by Thomas Hollingsworth of Tomduff, Feb. 1, 1794, on the neighbouring lands of Ballywaltermore, in which the lives named were those of his three sons - William, John and Samuel, this Samuel probably being our subject. (REGISTER, Vol. 1, page 61, Deed Memorial No. 19 (324918).) The son John married Sarah Maria Berney in 1803 and moved to Enniscorthy, County Wexford. Note the name Sarah Maria given to the youngest daughter of our subject. William married twice, and remained in Ireland, farming at Ballywaltermore. Daughters seem to have included Alice, who married John Fennell, and Eleanor married Abraham Parslow. Another child of Thomas and Alice probably was Nicholas Hollingsworth who married Lucinda Styles. (REGISTER, Vol. 3, pp. 101-105.)

Samuel's farm in New York was valued, in 1850, at \$3,500.00. His son John in 1860 had a farm worth \$9,000.00. Truly, they were, as described often, 'prosperous' men. The nationalistic Irish were unable, after all, to "wipe out" the colonialist Hollingsworths. Bravo!

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The Death of Ralph Hollingsworth

"RALPH HOLLINGSWORTH FALLS DEAD AT BALL GAME, VICTIM OF EXCITEMENT. Young Civil Engineer Who Visited Fabius to Watch the Diamond Contest Collapsed, Expiring Instantly as Home Run Was Made.

"With no score and two men on bases, Ralph Hollingsworth, aged 25, of this city fell dead of excitement yesterday afternoon at Fabius, when Arthur Rvan of the Fabius team knocked out a home run and brought in three scores. Young Hollingsworth's death was probably the most remarkable that has ever been known to have occurred from a similar cause. Apparently as strong and well as any young man a moment before, he fell backward just as Rvan's hit brought in three runs.

"For a moment no one realized what had occurred. The young man had straightened out and collapsed, but in the excitement attending the scoring his condition was not noted. Then one near him saw that Hollingsworth was white and still. The villagers, gathered for the afternoon of sport, were horrified. Dr. J. E. Ferris was summoned immediately and he saw at once that the young man was dead. The game was ended.

"Hollingsworth's home was in Lafayette, but for some time he had worked as civil engineer for the Lackawanna railroad in Syracuse. He was a son of George Hollingsworth of Lafayette, and yesterday he went to Fabius to see the Lafayette boys play a team from that village. He was enthusiastically in favor of the Lafayette team and had watched the game with interest.

"Three innings had been played without a score by either side. A little while before the ball had rolled near him and he picked it up and threw it back carelessly. He showed no trace of illness.

"In the last half of the third inning interest in the game became intense. Lafayette was out and Fabius was at bat. With no score Fabius had succeeded in getting two men on bases. Then Arthur Ryan stepped up to the plate. Ryan hit the ball squarely and it went far out into the field. Amid the cheers of the Fabius people the two men on bases came home and Ryan followed them in, making the score 3 to 0. Hollingsworth fell backward, where he was sitting, just as the hit was made.

"When it was found that he was dead the game stopped. No one had further interest in the game and the villagers went to their homes after the body of Hollingsworth was removed from the field. His people were notified, as was also Coroner George R. Kinne. Hollingsworth was very well known in Lafayette and Fabius. The funeral probably will be held there.

"There was no question that the excitement had caused his death."

(The above item was published in a newspaper near Onondaga County, New York. It was found by Mrs. Grace Hollingsworth Snyder among other articles in the old bible of her father Samuel D. Hollingsworth. The clipping bears no date. The type of printing suggests that the event took place sometime between 1900-1920, but it could have been earlier than 1900. Ralph Hollingsworth and his father, George, may have been related to one of the families in New York we published in the REGISTER, Vol. 3, pages 117, 118.)

"Looks Like Vegas Visitor Has Found Fountain of Youth -

"What's the secret of long life and happiness? "It's hereditary," claimed FRANK A. HOLLINGSWORTH, 100 years young, as he prepared to celebrate his birthday with wife, LILLIAN, and 35 friends at the Mint Hotel today.

"I never smoked or drank, either, but my mother lived to be 102 and other relatives lived into their 90's," smiled the slightly built man with thinning white hair. The Pomona, California resident turned 100 Sept. 16 but his wife celebrates her 76 birthday today and the couple decided to visit Las Vegas for the double occasion. They were married here eight years ago and frequently visit this resort city.

"Hollingsworth received congratulations from President Lyndon Johnson and Nebraska Gov. Norbert T. Tiemann, who pointed out Nebraska is also a century old.

"The son of a Civil War veteran, Hollingsworth was born in Pawnee, Neb. He describes himself as a jack of all trades. He carried mail by horse and buggy when Colorado was a young state. As the owner of a small Kansas newspaper he set type by hand and managed a small farm. In 1926 he decided to move to Pomona to be near one of his six children, three boys and three girls. In addition he proudly proclaims having 20 grandchildren and 50 great-grandchildren.



only five months prior to her grandmother's death (Oct. 15, 1892) in Kellogg. Lucy rests in Silent City alongside her grandmother and her uncle Wallace Hollingsworth, Wallace also having been raised by his mother along with Lucy.

It is not possible to tell from which side of her family Lucy received her name. It may have come from the McFaddens. This family were Scottish. They came either directly from Scotland or via the north of Ireland, in the period about 1718-1745, to Pennsylvania. Though most were Presbyterians, the particular branch in question were of the Methodist persuasion, early, perhaps as early as 1780. The name "Lucinda" was often used. On the other hand, the name also was popular in the County Wexford Hollingsworths. (See pages 133, 134.) Again, "Lucinda Vandyke" was the name of this subject's in-law relations, her uncle Samuel having married Addie Vandyke whose sister bore the name. It has never been used again in this family.

Lucy was taken from Kellogg, Iowa, to the bleak country of southern Minnesota, about 1876. Prior to that time she had lived with her parents in the town of Kellogg, where her father had a saloon. When she returned to her grandmother's residence, she became the housekeeper for her uncle and her grandmother. But she loved to do the housework, as reported to us by Aunt Anna Belden. She was a fine seamstress, also attested to by Aunt Anna, who herself was a professional sewer, and knew fine work when she saw it.

Her pictures show Lucinda Auten as a beautiful girl with a full, round face, large, expressive eyes, and a large amount of very lovely hair tastefully put up into the usual coiffure of that time. Being a seamstress, her clothing was no doubt of her own creation, and also neatly worn. She was the third of her family to die in their thirties; her oldest sister Nettie, died at age 35, her brother Fred at age 27.

TWO NORTH CAROLINA HOLLINGSWORTH WILLS

(1) The Last Will and Testament of ENOCH HOLLINGSWORTH

In the name of God amen, I, ENOCH HOLLINGSWORTH of Randolph County in North Carolina being weak in body but perfect in senses and memory (praised be God) do make this my last Will and testament.

Imprimis. I give unto my son ISAAC HOLLINGSWORTH my plantation in South Carolina in Ninty Six District living on Cane Creek the waters of Tvrer River allowing his Younger Brother JOSEPH HOLLINGSWORTH the half of the Value of the land when he comes of age, the land to be Entered by two free holders at that time to him and to his heirs forever — It is my Will that my Brother JOSEPH HOLLINGSWORTH have my two sons ISAAC and JOSEPH HOLLINGSWORTH untill they come to the age of twenty one and to give them reasonable schooling. It is my Will that my Sister MARTHA HACKINS (sic) have my two Daughters ANN and MARTHA HOLLINGSWORTH until they come to the age of Eighteen and to give them reasonable Schooling —

ITEM. I give my beloved Wife the Bed and furniture to her and her heirs forever —

ITEM. I give the remainder of my goods and chattles (sic) if any there be in the hands of my Executors hereafter named to my two Daughters ANN and MARTHA HOLLINGSWORTH to them and their heirs forever after my just Debts are paid. I do hereby Constitute my trusty friends and Brothers JOSEPH & ISAAC HOLLINGSWORTH my Executors of this my last Will and testament hereby revoking and Disavowing all former Wills and testaments. In Witness whereof to all and Every part of the above said Will and Testament I have hereunto Set my hand and Seal this 2nd of the 11th month 1784 --

The above Will and Testament was proved in Open Court by THOMAS & DAVID COX two of the subscribing Witnesses thereto and Ordered to be recorded. Recorded in Book 1, page 17.

NOTE by editor: The above will, as abstracted in Fred Olds' book of North Carolina Will Abstracts, is entered under the name of "Enoch Wallingsworth," (hence under the letter "w" instead of "h") and the only devisee given in the abstract is "son Joseph." (Woe to you, whose name is Hollingsworth, for you shall never get a fair shake from would-be genealogists!) This man was obviously a Quaker, from the style of his writing the date omitting the name of the month November. He was without doubt another son of Joseph<sup>3</sup> and Martha (Houghton) Hollingsworth (of Thomas<sup>2</sup> of Valentin<sup>1</sup> of Henry<sup>A</sup>.) who came to North Carolina before 1757. Examine our article "Valentine Hollingsworth's 'New Descendants,'" in Volume 2, pages 43-46. They had a daughter Martha, who married Benjamin Hawkins, as well as a son Isaac, and we believed at that time, a son Joseph too. The above proves this supposition. The land Enoch held indicates it was in the part of South Carolina which became Union District. The children, all young, went there to be raised by their aunt and uncle. If they all lived, it explains the multiplicity of "Isaacs" and "Josephs" among that

huge family. (See articles "Abstracts of Deeds, Union District, South Carolina," running serially here.)

(2) Will of CHARLES HOLLINGSWORTH, Beaufort County, North Carolina.

"In the Name of god amen I, CHARLES HOLLINGSWORTH of Beaufort County and the State of North Carolina being in good health in body and sound mind and memory blessed by god and knowing the mortality of all men that it is appointed of all men once To die I do therefore make this my last Will and Testament and First I Recommend my Soul into the hands of my god my faithfull Creator my Body to the dust nothing Doubting but it shall be raised at the general Resurrection both soul and body be united Together through the Merits of my Dearest lord and saviour Jesus Chrst and as Tutching my Worldly goods Which has been please god to bless me With in this life I will and bequeath in the Name as follows: First I lend to my Lovin<sup>g</sup> Wife MARY HOLLINGSWORTH all my lands and Tenements goods and Chattles and Negroes dureing her life and at her decias I do leave all my property to be Equally divided between my three youngest Children SARAH, ELIZABETH and DICEY HOLLINGSWORTH and allso I do give to my Daughter RACHEL NICKSON forty shillings To be paid in money. allso I do give To my other three oldest Daughters ALSY JONES (?), MARY SLADE and BECKAH PEARSE forty shillings to each. and I do herebv Constitute and appoint My loving Wife MARY HOLLINGSWORTH my Ext<sup>x</sup>. and my True and Trusty Friend JOSEPH PEARCE and my friend GEORGE HILL PEARCE my Executors to this my last Will and Testament Ratifving and Confirming this and No other to be my last Will and Testament in Witness Whereof I have herunto Set my hand and Seal this Twenty Ninth day of January 1789.

NOTE by editor: Charles Hollingsworth above appears to be the identical man who was at New Bern, in Craven County, North Carolina, from about 1739, and who served in the Revolutionary War on the Rebel side. His name appears in the Court records up until the last year of the war. A John Hollingsworth (Hollinsworth) also appeared there for the same period of time. We are certain these men do not descend from Valentine Hollingsworth the Quaker. It is likely that they were brothers, and came from the Queen Annes County, Maryland, family of Hollingsworths, who descended from John Hollingsworth who came into Talbot County, Maryland, with William Eltonhead in 1650. (See REGISTER, Volume One, page 127 et seq.) Olds' work (page 15) abstracted the will as follows: Hollingsworth, Charles, Beaufort County. Wife Mary, Sarah, Elizabeth, Dicey, Alsey, Mary, Rebecca, leaving out the married surnames of the oldest daughters and the name of Rachel altogether! Alas!

NOTE: The above Joseph Hollingsworth was the son of William and Hannah Hollingsworth of Union District. William is the William "Senior" who appears above. This Joseph also is designated as "Joseph Hollingsworth Junior" in the original deed from Thomas Schockley appearing in HOLLINGSWORTH REGISTER, Volume 2, page 19, Abstract No. 10. He was distinguished by the title "Junior" because his uncle Joseph also dwelt in the county at the same time. Putting together our information, it seems reasonable to assume that Joseph "Junior" above, son of William, (of Joseph<sup>3</sup>, Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Valentin<sup>1</sup>, Henry<sup>A</sup>), who was born Jan. 28, 1766 (See REGISTER, Vol. 1, page 22) was starting out in life at age 22 when he obtained his 183 acre tract in 1788. The above deed (no. 86) is a sale of same property. The whole family were Quakers, and were about to depart for Indiana Territory. In fact, they all were in Knox County, Indiana, by July, 1805, buying lands there. (REGISTER, Vol. 2, p. 138, Nos. 6, 8, 9.) Possibly the maiden name of Joseph's wife was Nancy SIMONSON. The last will of Magnus Simonson, of Union District, S.C., named one daughter Mary Hollingsworth. We do not know her husband's given name. He also named one daughter Nancy. It is also quite possible Joseph Hollingsworth had married first, Mary Simonson, but that she had died after her father's death about 1796, and that he had married as second wife, her younger sister, Nancy. (Theory only.) The following article, brief as it must be, will explain our latest theories about a part of this same family, as formulated after discovery of new records.

JOSEPH<sup>3</sup> HOLLINGSWORTH - MORE CHILDREN!

This is an addition to the article published in Volume 2, pages 43-46.

With very little added evidence here, we may confidently put the name of Enoch<sup>4</sup> Hollingsworth as a child of Joseph<sup>3</sup> and Martha (Houghton) Hollingsworth. We use the numbering system already used in our first article, Vol. 2, page 46:

7. ENOCH<sup>4</sup> HOLLINGSWORTH, born probably about 1752, Virginia or North Carolina (Anson County); died November, 1784, Randolph County, North Carolina, aged about 32 years. Name of wife not known. She survived him. (See Will, page 146). Issue: Isaac<sup>5</sup> (eldest son), Joseph<sup>5</sup>, Ann<sup>5</sup>, Martha<sup>5</sup>, all under age in 1784. All of them probably raised in Union District; South Carolina, the boys by Enoch's brother, Joseph<sup>4</sup>, the girls by his sister, Martha<sup>4</sup> Hawkins.

The following entry may need more explanation:

8. JACOB<sup>4</sup> HOLLINGSWORTH, born probably about 1744, Virginia; died 1816, Union District, South Carolina, aged about 72. Married, before 1770, BETTY TRAMMELL, daughter of Daniel Trammell of 96 District, S.C. (Will of Daniel Trammell, Book 1774-1779, Charleston, S.C. page 571, dated Sept. 10, 1777 courtesy Mrs. Paul Murff, Floydada, Tex., letter June 3, 1967 to editor.) Betty Hollingsworth died before Jacob died. Jacob moved into old Craven County, S.C. about 1772, at which time he obtained a land grant. Issue: Daniel<sup>5</sup> (married, 1798, first cousin Mary Hollingsworth, daughter of Isaac<sup>4</sup> Hollingsworth, for which act she was disowned from Quakers of Cane Creek Meeting, S.C. (REGISTER, Vol. 1, page 127) and moved to Knox Co., Indiana.) Abraham<sup>5</sup> (came to Bush River Quakers in 1788, probably moved to Greene County, Tennessee, living in 1840.) Amos<sup>5</sup>, (whose later abode and family is lost at present), Jacob<sup>5</sup>, who married Delpha Henderson and moved to Pickens County, Alabama. Hannah<sup>5</sup> (married Mr. ASHFORD), Martha<sup>5</sup> (married Mr. McCARSON), (See REGISTER, Vol. 1, pp. 114, 115, for complete copy of Jacob's<sup>4</sup> last Will and Testament.)

Up until recently, we thought that the above Jacob<sup>4</sup> was a brother of Joseph<sup>3</sup> rather than a son. We thought that Jacob<sup>3</sup> brother of Joseph<sup>2</sup> who married Susannah Haines, had also gone south, taking his family, and that the above was the same person. Not so. John V. Hollingsworth of Chadds Ford, Penna., showed us court records of Chester County, Pennsylvania, showing that Susannah Haines Hollingsworth was dead before June 17, 1783 in Chester County! Other Guardianship papers, etc., show names of children were Elizabeth, wife of Ephraim Jackson, Rachel, married Thomas Redman, Joseph, Jacob, Susannah, married Joseph Bartholomew, and Israel. Not the same man at all! As for the real Jacob<sup>3</sup>, he may have been the Revolutionary Pension applicant from Anderson County, Tennessee (claim rejected) who describes himself as having come from Chester Co., Penna., to South Carolina after the Revolution etc. (REGISTER, Volume 1, page 112.) But this isn't proved. Our "new theory" as above, is better supported by other proven facts. But this is not the last article of this series ... we hope!!!

(7) MEMORIALS TO HOLLINGSWORTHS FROM QUAKER PERIODICALS

1. "THOMAS HOLLINGSWORTH, the son of THOMAS HOLLINGSWORTH was born near Newark, in New Castle County on Delaware, 12th month, 23rd, 1698. Educated as a member of our religious society, by piously concerned parents, and having his understanding opened by Divine grace to see and appreciate the truth, he received it, and dwelt in it. In the 12th month, 1722, he was married to JUDITH LAMPLY, who was for many years his affectionate help-meet, and also after a few years a serviceable member of Newark Monthly Meeting. "About the year 1728 he received a gift in the ministry, which, as he exercised it faithfully, was increased to the comfort and edification of the church. 'He was exemplary in attending meetings for worship and discipline, being a solid waiter therein, and a serviceable friend in the Society in divers respects; much concerned for peace in the church, labouring to restore it as occasion required.'  
 "In the exercise of his gift, he at different times, visited the brethren in Jersey, Maryland, and parts of Virginia, and in the year 1753 obtained a certificate for religious service in Carolina. (NOTE: See above, page 154, certificate no. 9.) He left home to perform this prospect in the Eighth month of that year, but had not proceeded far before he was taken unwell. The disorder increasing, in a few days he was removed from his labours in the church militant. He departed this life the 1st of the Ninth month, at Pike Creek (NOTE: Should be "Pipe Creek.") in Maryland. He was, says his memorial, 'greatly missed in the meeting to which he belonged, as well as in his family, and the neighbourhood where he dwelte.' He was 54 years, and had been a minister 25 years." (THE FRIEND, Philadelphia, Penna., lmo. 2, 1858, Volume 31, page 132.)

2. "KATHARINE ROBINSON. KATHARINE HOLLINGSWORTH, daughter of VALENTINE HOLLINGSWORTH, one of the first settlers in the neighbourhood of Newark, was born in the year 1663. We have already mentioned in the account of her husband, GEORGE ROBINSON, their hospitality, and zeal for the promotion of Truth. We may add concerning her, that she continued faithful, diving in unity with her friends, 6mo. 29th, 1746, in the 83rd year of her age." (THE FRIEND, Volume 30, page 244. 4th month, 7, 1857.)

BOUNTY LAND WARRANTS - PART ONE

There are, reportedly, about 100,000 separate files of Bounty Land Warrants in the National Archives, Washington, D.C. 20408, which are "unscheduled" in any of their publications, or, rather, which have no index. The reason given by the personnel is that they are unattached to any Pension Application files. The persons who received Land Warrants on the Public Domain Lands, for the War of 1812 (Acts of 1850 and 1855) or for later wars, such as the "Indian Wars," or the survivors of soldiers killed in service in the War of 1812, may not have lived until the time that the Pension Acts were passed. The War of 1812 Pension act, for example, didn't appear until 1871! This writer purchased an original negative film of the some seventy-two HOLLINGSWORTH (HOLLINSWORTH, etc.) Warrant Files out of this series. The 68 feet of film cost \$36.00. (Last year, three full rolls (300ft) of the same, negative 35 mm. film of the Parish Registers of Mottram, Cheshire, England, cost exactly the same amount. Why it is possible to obtain more than three times as much film from England for the same price as a little over half a roll costs in U.S.A., is a matter for an expert! The recent devaluation of the Pound Sterling probably will reduce the cost even more! But, as we all know, American prices never go down, unless a terrible disaster such as the 1929 crash, forces it! (People never learn!) We abstract these, with references as to "can, bundle," and particulars. Applicants may send a fee for Xerox copies of any file to the above address. We present them only in the order we abstracted them, taking the ones which interested us first.

- 1) ENOCH HOLLINSWORTH, Private, Capt. Love's Co., 43rd Infantry, War of 1812. 12-160-24969. Can 1657; Bundle 11. Enlisted Nov. 13, 1813 for 5-years. Died Aug. 17, 1814. Back pay sent to the widow by attorney Nov. 21, 1820. Affidavit dated Sept Court, Haywood County, North Carolina, 1821 attesting that ELI HOLLINSWORTH was legal heir of the soldier, with Elijah Dever & Elisa Cuninghame as affiants, Robert Love, Clerk. Warrant number 24,969 for 160 acres was issued Jan. 14, 1822 to "ELI HOLLINGSWORTH and the other heirs at law of ENOCH HOLLINGSWORTH." The Archives advised us separately that said warrant was entered in Monroe County, Arkansas, for the northeast quarter of Section 29, Township 1 South, Range 2 West. County Clerk at Clarendon, Ark., affirms this (letter Dec. 12, 1967) but advises "The abstract books show no transfer by anyone by the name of Hollingsworth since that date." (He was the son of Samuel Hollingsworth. REGISTER, Vol. 2 p.147)
- 2) ENOCH HOLLINGSWORTH, Private, Capt. Daniel Felder's Co., Col. Hugh Means' South Carolina Militia, War of 1812. 55-160-20,697. Can 1029, Bundle 119. Affidavit dated Feb. 23, 1856, REBECCA HOLLINGSWORTH, widow, with witnesses CYNTHIA SMITH, JOHN DUNCAN. Another affidavit

dated March 9, 1855, by JAMES SMITH, indicates affiant knew the soldier and his wife, "both of Union District, South Carolina," and that name of widow before marriage was REBECKAH SMITH, married to said ENOCH HOLLINGSWORTH on Aug. 6, 1809, in Union District. TAMER BROCK, in her deposition (Mar. 27, 1855,) from Pickens District, S.C., by her "x" mark, affirms wedding date. REBECKAH HOLLINGSWORTH, in her own certificate (Mar 25, 1855, Pickens District, S.C.) states she was married on above date by Coleman Carlisle, Preacher of the Gospel, and that her maiden name was as given above, "and that the said ENOCH HOLLINGSWORTH has now three living children, whose names are WILEY WARREN HOLLINGSWORTH, ROBERT HOLLINGSWORTH, AND JAMES IVY HOLLINGSWORTH." (See this issue, pages 150, 152.) Other documents.

3) AVANANT HOLLINGSWORTH. 55-120-35,396, Private Capt. Samuel Hollingsworth's Company, Illinois Volunteers, Col. S. Thompson, "Black Hawk War," of 1832, Can 561, Bundle 109. Affidavit of Soldier, aged 50, dated Dec. 10, 1850, at Greene County, Missouri. (REGISTER, this issue, page 142.) Entered service April 1, 1832, Fort Armstrong, mustered out June 20, 1832 at Ottawa, Ills. Witnesses included HENRY FULBRIGHT. (Soldier's first cousin, from other sources.) This witness appears on every affidavit signed by the soldier. Another document, dated Aug 30, 1856, indicates warrant was "lost in mail," or stolen, and Avnant Hollingsworth had issued a caveat to prevent fraudulent use.

4) SAMUEL HOLLINGSWORTH. 55-120-43,382, Can 595 Bundle 89. Captain, Samuel Hollingsworth's Company, 4th Regiment, Ills. Volunteers, Black Hawk (Indian) War, 1832. Affidavit Nov. 22, 1850, Fulton County, Ills. SAMUEL HOLLINGSWORTH, aged 52, resident of Schuyler County, Illinois. Entered service April 15, discharged June 1, 1832, Ottawa, Ills. Also affidavit April 11, 1855, by soldier "aged 57 or 59," same residence. Affidavit April 21, 1879, by THOMAS CARTER, Attorney at Law, Beardstown, Ills., in behalf of SAMUEL D. HOLLINGSWORTH. "(soldier) is an old, blind man near 80 years of age and is justly entitled to a land warrant or pension..."

6) ABRAHAM HOLLINGSWORTH. 55-120-31546, Can 544, Bundle 114. Private same company as above Nos. 4 & 5. Affidavit Fulton Co., Ills., soldier aged 42, resident of that county, A.T. ROBERTSON, J.P. as in all above Fulton County depositions. Affidavit Oct. 20, 1855, Henry County, Iowa, soldier aged 47, REUBEN BEERS, KEELING MAULDING, witnesses. Letter by R. J. HARPER, Attorney, May 28, 1901, asking if heirs of soldier may be entitled to more land..."widow is deceased, 3 adult heirs and one heir deceased, but deceased heir has 4 children who are of age. etc." (No other documents on this subject.)

7) ALEXANDER HOLLINGSWORTH. 55-120-66,407 Can 696, Bundle 54. 1st Lt., same company as above three soldiers, same service. Affidavit Nov. 22, 1850, Fulton County, Ills., soldier, aged 48, residence of Schuyler Co. Ills. A.T. ROBERTSON, J.P. Affidavit Aug. 2, 1855, Fulton County, Ill. DELILY (DELILAH) HOLLINGSWORTH, aged 39, resident of Schuyler County, Ills., widow of said soldier. Maiden name DELILA HUFF, married Sept. 14, 1842, by WILLIAM WISDOM, J.P. Soldier died at Browning, Schuyler Co., Ills., April 9, 1855. Her X mark. SAMUEL HOLLINGSWORTH, witness.

As a final remark on these later innovations in the surname of Hollingworth (Hollinworth), it might be interesting, even funny, to recount a few of these, as we found them in modern directories, as well as in the census, though the latter differences do not always reflect the desired spelling by the householder. HOLLANDSWORTH, HOLLANSWORTH, HOLANDSWORTH, HOLANSWORTH (shorter and shorter); HOLLANDWORTH, HOLLANWORTH, HOLANDWORTH, HOLLANWORTH (shortest?). HOLLINGWORTH (on the stencil address labels the editor's mother receives with her copies of leading periodicals), HOLLENSWORTH (a German spelling found in the Reformed Church, Philadelphia, 1768); (HOLTZWARTH is somewhat of a true German surname, by the way); HOLLINSWORTH, HALLINSWORTH, HALLINGWORTH, HALLINWORTH, (of course); HOLLYWORTH (a few times); HOLLINGSWORTHS and HOLLINTSWORTH (both legitimate forms now in use as per the telephone directories) and finally HELLINGWORTH, found once! This is probably not the least bit 'exhaustive' in its scope. But at least, and at long last ... we know why that mysterious "s" is there, or, as it really should be presented, " 's ".

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"ALUMNI DUBLINENSES"

Here are the only Hollingsworths who graduated from Trinity College, Dublin, 1593-1895:

HOLLINGSWORTH, ARTHUR GEORGE HARPER, Entered college, Oct. 16, 1820, aged 18. Son of SAMUEL HOLLINGSWORTH, gentleman. Born London. B.A. Spring 1825. M.A. Spring 1828. He later became Vicar of Monkstown church, Co. Cork, and then at Stowe Market, Co Suffolk, England. He wrote a number of books on religious subjects. His father, Samuel, supposedly lived in "Ince Hall," Lancashire. (Burtchaell & Sadleir, Alumni Dublinenses (1593-1860); Church rec. Monkstown, Ire. Died 1859.)

HOLLINGSWORTH, SAMUEL, (of the Wesleyan Methodist faith) son of PETER HOLLINGSWORTH, Gorey, County Wexford, merchant, and his wife, HANNAH COPE. B.A. Spring 1871; B.D. & M.A. Summer 1888; D.D. Summer 1891. He later became the Principal of Wesley College, Dublin. His portrait hangs there with those of the other faculty. (A Catalogue of Graduates of the University of Dublin 1868-1895; letters from the library, Wesley College; Parish Register of Gorey Wesley Chapel.)

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A T E R R I B L E E R R O R

This is apropos of the above article "The Best Explanation Yet". The Los Angeles Central Library recently acquired "THE COLLEGE OF ARMS" a very large, thick book, published in London in 1963, dealing with the records of every member of the famous College on Queen Victoria Street in London, England. On page 183 we were startled to see: THOMAS HOLLINGSWORTH Rose Blanche Pursuivant at Arms, temp. Edward IV.; Blucmantle Pursuivant at Arms, temp. Edward IV. York, temp. Edward IV. Arms: Azure, on a bend argent 3 (holly) leaves vert. Crest: A stag lodged argent. IN the old "The General Armoury" by Burke, this man was referred to only as "Hollingsworth - York Herald, temp. Rich. III!" Anyway, that time period is about 1483-1485. We have not been able to challenge, or verify, that spelling with the letter "s". Take note, please, that both Burke, over 80 years ago, and the editors of the

Page 182 states 'the first reliable reference to York (herald) is in 1484.' So our Thomas Hollingsworth was the last of the "unreliable" officeholders. Rather, his holding of that office is unverified. He is reported to have attended the funeral of King Edward IV. and to have been in France at about that time. The sources quoted or cited, haven't been found, i.e. "Scottish Record Series," and "Rolls Series." They are the only sources we found not given in the key to sources in the first part of the book! They certainly are vague and ambiguous!

But then, on page 196, we found this: "29. JOHN HOLLINGSWORTH Risbank, patented 29 April 1554. Bluemantle, nominated 1557, created 9 Dec. 1558, patented 20 Sept. 1559. The last Risebank; in France at New Year 1559; buried St. Bride's Fleet Street 10 Oct., 1559. Arms: Azure on a bend or, 3 holly leaves vert. Crest: A Stag lodged argent." (This arms bears a gold diagonal bar beneath the holly leaves, but both of these arms bore a silver (differenced) stag for crest.)

Again the spelling with the 'medial s'. But with this man's identity were some findable source references. In "Calendar of Patent Rolls," (at Huntington Library, San Marino, California), In volume under the reign of "Philip & Mary," (1 year of Mary alias 'Bloody Mary', 20 April, 1554, Part XV. Membrane 6, P.R.O. London) Volume I., page 384: "Grant for life, in cons. of his service, to JOHN HOLLYNGWORTH of the office of Rushebank pursuivant\*at arms, with 8d. a day for the exercise of the same to be paid at the Receipt of the Exchequer at Calais from Michaelmas last." Note here, the original record has no hint of 'medial s'. Again, in Vol. I., Elizabeth, page 46, Membrane 32, 30 Sept., 1559 "Creation for life, for his service, of JOHN HOLLINGWORTH alias Roushebanke as Blewmantell pursuivant in ordinary, yearly fee of 10l. payable at the Exchequer, from Michaelmas, 1558." Once more, the original shows no sibilant letter "s" between Holling and Worth! But how many people flushed with the sudden sense of pride over finding such an authoritative (?) work, will stop to consider (if they can even find it) our mimeographed pamphlet, and learn of this terrible error? (Terrible it is. We are not being hysterical.) (\* Pronounced 'Pur-swi-vant.')

We will continue to pursue the earlier (1485) reference until we run it to earth and prove or disprove it. That arms, viz. with the silver stag for crest, actually belonged to a branch of the HOLLINGSWORTH family of Mottram, Cheshire. Below is a reproduction of their official pedigree.

The illustration of the familiar Hollingworth Arms is marked: Azure, on a bend argent, three holly leaves proper; Crest, a stag couchant (or, lodged) argent. Motto: Disce ferenda pati. The pedigree was signed "DANIEL HOLLINGWORTH." He was a householder in London that year (1634). His daughter, and only surviving child, became allied with the family known as "Cropæv of Clerkinwell" which also were an armigerous family. (From Visitation of London, 1634, published in Vol. 15 of Harleian Society Publications.) A note given below the illustration of arms says "The field (shield) is marked sable (black) in the original Visitation." Just what "original visitation," is not explained. In "Lincolnshire Pedigrees" published in the same series, is a representation of the Manuscript C. 23, Heralds' College, for "HOLLINGWORTH OF LINCOLN," showing an arms "Sable (black), on a bend argent three holly leaves proper." These men also were in the garment and drapery business.

On the pedigree above, the first John Hollingworth shown could possibly be the descendant (son or grandson) of the Thomas Hollingworth who was York Herald in the time of Edward the Fourth and of Richard the Third. This is possible because their coats of arms are identical, with exception of the addition of a motto (a later form of arms depiction) in the London family. The arms of John, Bluemantle who died in 1559 seems to have become at that time extinct, because it hasn't been mentioned since, the gold cross-bar (bend) being unique. Nevertheless, both arms are but differences (younger sons) of the Mottram family arms. Here, however, is a paradoxical thing: These references to differenced arms are actually much older than the depictions or grants recorded, of the original arms! The first mention and depiction of the Mottram arms is in the Cheshire Visitation of 1613.

Codicil (undated) revoked appointment of JAMES ABBOTT as one of the Trustees and appointed son THOMAS as in his place and as Executor.
- (55) JOHN HOLLINGWORTH, late of Davyhulme, Co Lancaster, labourer, deceased, Administration Intestate. 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C O N C L U D E D

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P R O F . S . E . H O L L I N G W O R T H

Professor Sydney Ewart Hollingworth, who died yesterday (June 23, 1966) in London, was Yates-Goldsmid Professor of Geology at University College London since 1946. He was 66. Hollingworth was born on Nov. 7, 1899, and educated at Clare College, Cambridge, where he took a first class degree in Natural Sciences, and was later a Harkness research scholar in geology. He joined the Geological Survey of Great Britain in 1921. He was distinguished for his work on the Quaternary system and particularly on the glaciation of north-west England, on the geology of the Lake District, on British deposits of gyp-

Sum and anhydrate, and on the iron ore deposits of the east Midlands. He was an outstanding field geologist with great ability to map and interpret the structure of a piece of country.

He went to University College in 1945 and helped it through the difficult postwar years of small space and small craft, enlarging the department and widening its interests, taking his staff and research students overseas, starting work in Norway on the ancient rocks, north of the Arctic Circle. In the mid-fifties he went to Chile when sulphur was short and while there recognized the geological significance of this region with its recent volcanoes and earth movements. In the early sixties he took out a research group of students and staff to make geological maps in Chile. The interests of this group were economic geology, nitrates for example, geomorphology and recent volcanicity. In Britain his interests lay in water resources, particularly in north-west England, in evaporite deposits, and in general economic geology. In University College his special interests were economic geology, conservation, and geomorphology, and in 1965 by his initiative a subdepartment of hydrogeology was established.

He will be remembered for his clarity of vision in relation to geological problems, his ability to cut away the frills and see the core of a problem, and particularly the stimulating way in which he conducted field excursions with students and staff.

He served on the council of the Geological Society of London. He was the secretary of the Geological Society from 1949 to 1956; vice-president 1956-58 and 1962-64; and president 1960-62.

NOTE: This item is entirely in Latin and is also in old English script, therefore becoming very difficult to decipher. "Fines & Recoveries" were not lawsuits in the modern sense, but were a legal method of restoring title or quitting title to lands. This item seems to answer the question, 'When did Valentine Hollingsworth, the Quaker, sell his title to Ballyvickcrannell, Parish of Seagoe, County Armagh?' He purchased full ownership of the 120 acres thereof, from Michael Harrison, on Aug. 22, 1664. See Hollingsworth Register, Vol. 2, page 81. This fine indicates he sold the rights to Henry Jenny or Janny at about the time that Valentine's son Henry returned to Ireland to marry Lydia Atkinson, Aug. 22, 1783. Note the coincidence of dates above.
